email List of days of the year About Boris Johnson's 56th birthday party Events of the UK's Partygate scandal began on 23 March 2020, when, in an effort to limit deaths during the COVID-19 pandemic, Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced new rules prohibiting gatherings of people who were not in the same household. Despite these regulations,
regular social gatherings continued to take place in Downing Street and Whitehall, including a surprise party for Johnson's 56th birthday on 19 June (pictured). News articles about these events began to appear in late 2021, with the majority of them published by the journalists Pippa Crerar and Paul Brand. Johnson denied any wrongdoing, and stated
that the rules were followed at all times. In January 2022, a criminal investigation into the scandal was launched by the Metropolitan Police. As a result, 126 fixed penalty notices were issued, including one to Johnson for attending his surprise birthday party, making him the first serving prime minister to be found to have broken the law. Johnson

defeats against Russia in the second half of the century. In South Asia, the death of Mughal emperor Aurangzeb was followed by the expansion of the Maratha Confederacy and an increasing level of European influence and control in the region. In 1739, Persian emperor Nader Shah invaded and plundered Delhi, the capital of the Mughal Empire.
Later, his general Ahmad Shah Durrani scored another victory against the Marathas, the then dominant power in India, [9][8] and by the end of the century, the Anglo-Mysore Wars against Tipu Sultan and his father
Hyder Ali, led to Company rule over the south.[10][11] In East Asia, the century was marked by the High Qing era, a period characterized by significant cultural and territorial expansion. This period also experienced relative peace and prosperity, allowing for societal growth, increasing literacy rates, flourishing trade, and consolidating imperial power

Rajasthan Royals, by seven wickets to win their maiden title in their first season.[9] Although earlier reports suggested the addition of two more teams in the previous season,[10][11][12] the BCCI delayed the expansion of the league until 2022.[13][14] In August 2021, it was confirmed that two new franchises would join the league in 2022, with a
shortlist of locations including Ahmedabad, Cuttack, Dharamshala, Guwahati, Indore and Lucknow.[15][16] In a closed bidding auction held in October 2021, RPSG group and CVC Capital won the right to the two new franchises.[17][18] RPSG paid ₹7,090 crore (US$840 million) for the Lucknow franchise, and CVC won the Ahmedabad franchise for
