In the New Testament, Christians (especially women) are taught that they should dress modestly and place a high priority on pursuing good works and on a godly character (1Timothy 2:9 - 10, 1Peter 3:1 -
4). Jewelry, like so many other things in the Bible (wealth, food, alcohol, etc.), is not prohibited of and by itself. What is condemned is selfishly pursuing them to the detriment of self, others, and a close personal relationship with God. One of the topics that one might doubt if they are in the Bible or not is jewellery. The scripture has a

nowhere in the Bible that mentions that jewellery is a sin. However, there is a proper way to adorn yourself if you are a Christian. As mentioned above, one of the most notable passages in the New Testament when
it comes to jewellery is 1 Timothy 2:9-10. This passage encourages women to adorn themselves with modesty, self-control, and good works rather than excessively focusing on external appearance, including jewellery. Additionally, in the book Matthew 6:19-21, Jesus teaches about prioritizing heavenly treasures over earthly ones. Though this passage
does not specifically address jewellery, it highlights the importance of focusing on eternal values rather than placing our excessive value on material possessions. We need to cultivate our relationship with God and align our hearts with Him. Therefore, the New Testament focuses more on matters of the heart, character, and spiritual priorities rather
than providing specific guidelines or prohibitions regarding jewellery. However, Paul is clear that we should wear jewellery in moderation when it comes to personal adornment. It is key to note that adorning yourself in moderation depends on the
different cultural contexts and the impact it may have on others. Giving jewellery can symbolize various things depending on the different cultural contexts. Most people exchange jewellery holds include; A symbol of wealth: In the Bible,
jewellery was used as a symbol of wealth and abundance. It was often associated with prosperity and blessings from God. For instance, in the story of the prodigal son (Luke 15:22), the father celebrates the return of his lost son by giving him a ring, which represents the restoration of his status and inheritance. Symbolizes transfer of authority:
 Jewelry, such as a signet ring, could symbolize authority and power in biblical times. In the book of Genesis, Joseph was given a signet ring by Pharaoh (Genesis 41:42), which symbolized his appointment as second-in-command over Egypt and granted him authority and privilege. Love: Jewelry is often given as a symbol of love and affection. It can
represent deep emotional connections, commitment, and romantic relationships. This could be seen in engagement rings, wedding bands, and heart-shaped pendants. A symbol of gratitude for our loved ones: Jewelry can be given as a token of appreciation or gratitude. It may symbolize acknowledgment of someone's efforts, support, or achievements
For example, a piece of jewellery could be given as a gift to a parent, friend, mentor, or even lover to express gratitude for their guidance or assistance. Symbolizes connection: Jewelry can also represent the bond and connection between friends or family members are family members.
attached to necklaces in the Bible include; A symbol of beauty: In several instances, jewellery, including necklaces, is mentioned as part of a person's adornment or attire, emphasizing beauty and elegance. Isaiah 3:16-21 describes the luxurious and extravagant accessories worn by the women of Jerusalem, including anklets, sashes, perfume boxes
and necklaces. These descriptions highlight the desire for outward beauty and the pursuit of material wealth, which the passage critiques. Symbol of Honor: Jewelry, including necklaces, can be associated with honor and worth. In Proverbs 1, wisdom is described as a graceful garland and a necklace that brings honor to those who embrace it. This
metaphor suggests that possessing wisdom is valuable and brings honor and respect. You can wear jewellery. Apostle Paul reminds us in the book of 1 Peter 3:3-4 of the need to focus on our hearts rather
than adorning ourselves with excessive jewellery. This means that though we can wear jewellery, our motives should be healthy, and we should do so in modesty and moderation. Though some Christians believe wearing jewellery is a great way to express your style and enhance your
beauty, so long as you are doing so to glorify God and not yourself. However, it is also key to note that true beauty is inward (comes from the soul) and not from our outward appearance. As Christians, our focus should be on worshipping God alone and not allowing any external objects to become a distraction or avenue for
idolatry. While wearing jewelry for adornment is not inherently wrong, we should be cautious about the symbols and meanings attached to them, ensuring their time in the wilderness, the people of Israel removed
their ornaments as a sign of repentance and a turning back to God. This act represented a desire to set aside anything that could hinder their relationship with Him. Similarly, as followers of Christ, we should examine our hearts and ask ourselves if our love for jewelry or our desire to be fashionable is overshadowing our love and devotion to God. It is
important to maintain a balance, ensuring of gold or an ornament of fine gold is the rebuke of a wise judge to a listening ear. This verse uses the analogy of a valuable earring or ornament to illustrate the importance and impact of a wise
rebuke. Just as a beautiful piece of jewelry can enhance one's appearance, a well-timed and wise rebuke can bring about positive change in a person's life. As Christians, we should value constructive criticism and correction from those who are wise and trustworthy. Embracing such guidance can help us grow spiritually and become more Christ-like
Just as gold is refined through the refining process, constructive criticism can refine our character and deepen our relationship with God. 1 Timothy 2:9-10 Likewise also that women should adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control, not with braided hair and gold or pearls or costly attire, but with what is proper for
women who profess godliness—with good works. This verse emphasizes the importance of modesty and self-control when it comes to our outward appearance. It advises against excessive display of wealth and elaborate hairstyles or jewelry, placing greater importance on a woman's character and good works. While this verse specifically addresses
women, the underlying message applies to both men and women. Our focus should be on cultivating humility, inner beauty, and demonstrating godliness through acts of kindness and service, rather than seeking external validation through flashy adornments. Proverbs 11:22 As a ring of gold in a swine's snout, so is a beautiful woman who lacks
discretion. This proverb draws a comparison between a valuable gold ring in the snout of a pig and a beautiful woman who lacks discernment and wisdom. It highlights the significance of inner beauty, wisdom, and discretion over mere outward attractiveness. As Christians, we should prioritize developing a Christ-like character and cultivating
wisdom, recognizing that true beauty stems from a heart that loves and follows God. External adornments may fade or lose their appeal, but a person's character, grounded in faith, will endure and make a lasting impact. Isaiah 61:10 I delight greatly in the LORD; my soul rejoices in my God. For He has clothed me with garments of salvation and

goal is to live in a way that pleases God and brings Him glory. While wearing jewelry may not directly signify wisdom, it is a reminder that our external choices should align with our desire to pursue godliness and honor God in all that we do. Colossians 3:5 Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire,
and covetousness, which is idolatry. These verses from Paul's letter to the Colossians urge believers to put to death the sinful and worldly desires that can hinder our walk with Christ. It specifically mentions covetousness, which is described as a form of idolatry, putting something above God in our hearts. While wearing jewelry may not inherently be
equated with idolatry, these verses remind us to examine our motives and desires. If our love for jewelry becomes a source of covetousness or excessive materialistic focus, we should reevaluate our priorities and ensure that our hearts are set on God above all else. Deuteronomy 7:25 You shall burn the carved images of their gods with fire. You shall
not covet the silver or gold that is on them or take it for yourselves, lest you be ensuared by it, for it is an abomination to the LORD your God. God commanded the Israelites to destroy the idols and the silver and gold associated with them, emphasizing the danger of coveting or desiring material possessions that are connected to false gods. While
wearing jewelry itself may not be wrong, this verse serves as a reminder to quard our hearts against the temptation of idolatry. We should not idolatry to material possessions, recognizing that our true worth and fulfillment come from our relationship with the one true God. 1 Samuel 2:10 The adversaries of
the LORD shall be broken to pieces; against them he will thunder in heaven. The LORD will judge the earth; he will give strength to his king and exalt the horn of his anointed." This verse expresses praise and confidence in God's power and sovereignty. It acknowledges His role as the ultimate judge, who provides strength to His anointed

James 2:2-4 For if a man wearing a gold ring and fine clothing comes into your assembly, and a poor man in shabby clothing
also comes in, and if you pay attention to the one who wears the fine clothing and say, "You sit here in a good place," while you say to the poor man, "You stand over there," or, "Sit down at my feet," have you not then made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts? James addresses the issue of showing favoritism or
making distinctions based on external appearances. He warns against giving preferential treatment to those who are less fortunate. When it comes to the topic of wearing jewelry, this passage reminds us to be mindful of how our choices may be perceived in relation to socioeconomic
status or as a means of displaying wealth.
