The service schedule includes car maintenance every 30,000 km (or equivalent miles) or annually; this is displayed automatically with the ignition key at MAR starting from 2,000 km, servicing indications are displayed more frequently. A programmed maintenance interval will display a message showing the number of km/mi or days to go before car servicing when approaching the service interval. To reset the service due, follow these steps: With the key in the ignition but not started, press and hold the trip meter reset button for about 10 seconds. This procedure is specific to other models, as a special scanner tool is required to turn off the maintenance error. To update the service coupon using the provided software, open the program and select the vehicle type, enable the panel, and choose the "Service-Intervall-Reset" point. Select the correct side and click "ok." Wait for the system to update, then shut down the panel and check if the Service Interval on their Fiat Stilo 1.9 JTD models. One user tried manually resetting it through the dashboard control menu but was unsuccessful. Another user set custom intervals, but the dealer rejected them. It appears that dealers may not be well-informed about Stilo maintenance procedures. I am having issues with my Fiat Stilo's "Service Due" warning light. which refuses to reset even after completing a service coupon. The manufacturer's guidelines suggest using an ODB interface to update the system, but I don't have access to one. The problem is exacerbated by the fact that my work garage only uses specific franchise diagnostic equipment, which wouldn't be helpful in this situation. As someone with experience working as a service advisor at a main dealership, I'm aware of how often customers are overcharged for simple tasks like this. I recently had the same issue with another car and managed to resolve it by taking it to an independent garage, which can perform similar functions at a lower cost. The Fiat Examiner or similar equipment is reportedly necessary to reset the system, but its high price is a significant barrier. I'm due for a service on my Stilo 1.6, but I need to reset the service warning light first. To be honest, I'd rather have it serviced by technicians who regularly work on Fiats, not Vauxhalls. If I owned a Vauxhall, I'd take it to them, though! It's funny, because I had a Vectra with an ABS light issue and two Vauxhall dealers diagnosed problems that turned out to be a simple fix - I replaced the ABS block myself for £75! I've heard similar stories from other Fiat owners who've had issues with Vauxhall technicians. We bought our first Stilo from a Vauxhall garage, but when we got it home, we noticed engine low pressure lights and oil leaks! The service department told us it wasn't their concern since the car had left their premises... Needless to say, we rejected the car and ended up with a different one. When I bought my current 5-door Stilo, I made sure to get it serviced at a Fiat dealership. It's true that some dealerships sell multiple brands, so you should always check if your non-Fiat make has been properly inspected before buying. Now, about my service issue... my warranty ran out, and I had to have it done by a family friend (at another dealership). They charged me £20 to reset the service warning light. Last year, I had my 2nd-year service at a non-Fiat garage to save money, but they couldn't reset the "service due" indicator, so I've been dealing with that issue since September. Lately, my car's been having some issues - the wheel starts juddering when I brake! Since I drive 50 miles round-trip daily, I think it's time to get this checked out. I went to AMC in Chelmsford (my Fiat garage), but they don't carry out services anymore since Toomeys took over... A garage checked my car and told me it needs new front discs and pads, which costs £286. However, they only charged £20 to reset the service due indicator, despite telling me they couldn't afford it. I'm wondering if this is reasonable and whether I can claim it back from Fiat. I recently had a similar issue with another garage in Southend, where the non-Fiat garage charged me £100 less for the same work. Given that my 3-year warranty expires soon, I don't want to drive all the way to Chelmsford, so I'll use a local garage instead. Some people think £20 is fair for resetting the service due indicator, as it's not something that would happen with normal maintenance. Others claim that many dealerships wouldn't do this without charge more than an hour of labour for it. One person had a similar issue with Piccadilly Fiat in Wakefield, where they charged £5 to reset the service indicator. I recently had a "Service due" message on my Argo, which I took to the National AA service centre. They couldn't reset the counter, so I had to pay a dealer to do it, as it's part of the service, I always make sure the counter is reset and all books are stamped. Nationwide Autocentre gets top marks from me for their service. for £40-£70? Who/Where/What? I agree with others who think that service engineer by trade, i prefer to do things myself. Our local main dealer charges only 79 pounds for a BronzeCare service which includes resetting the service light, so its not a huge loss for me if they wont do it. The question is, can you turn it off or reset it yourself? Some argue that it's only used as a reminder function, but others believe it's part of an electronic service history. Some independent garages claim to be able to do the job using compatible software, but there are concerns about potential risks involved. One possible solution is to use an Examiner tester, which can reset the "service due" message by changing certain values on the instrument cluster. However, this requires some technical knowledge and may not be feasible for everyone. Others have found that Bosch service agents can do the job for a relatively low cost. Meanwhile, there's even a DIY solution being developed, but it requires a significant investment of time and money. The author has already discovered the "service reset code" but is willing to sell it to others who want to create a group purchase. It seems that using an Examiner tester is still the most reliable option, which costs around £45 at a Fiat main dealer. However, there are those who believe that finding a solution or even creating one would be beneficial for everyone involved. I just got rid of this warning message using Examiner.
